In Navajo weaving, the slit weave technique common in kilims is not used, and the warp is one continuous length of yarn, not extending beyond the weaving as fringe. Traders from the late 19th and early 20th century encouraged adoption of some kilim motifs into Navajo designs.

Navajo - Wikipedia Cheap blankets were imported, so Navajo weavers shifted their focus to weaving rugs for an increasingly non-Native audience. Rail service also brought in Germantown wool from Philadelphia , commercially dyed wool which greatly expanded the weavers' color palettes. Navajo Weaving: Rugs & blankets which represent Navajo ... After this period Navajo weavers started to use a three-ply yarn called Saxony, which is a high-quality, naturally dyed silk thread. Symbols and motifs in Navajo weaving | Canyon Road Arts A design element that appeared in Navajo weaving from the late 19th century and continued until the late 1930s is the Navajo â€œwhirling logs.â€• This design is recognized by Anglos as a swastika and caused great controversy in the late 1930s. Navajo Weaving - Cameron Trading Post The Navajo and Pueblo looms are practically identical, but the Navajo would have that the knowledge of weaving was already theirs when they first came in contact with the Pueblos.
